

Housing Market Indicators

Monthly Update



January 2021

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

National housing market indicators available as of January showed activity in housing markets overall improved. Housing market activity has been strong as buyers took advantage of record-low mortgage rates and the economy reopened more broadly. Trends in some of the top indicators for this month include:

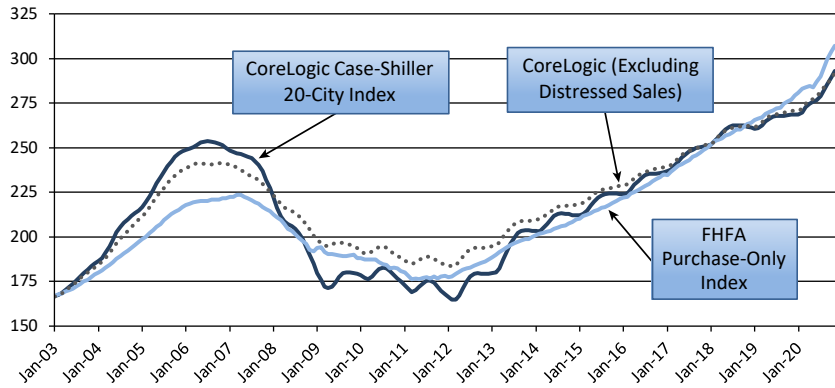
- **Purchases of new homes increased.** New single-family home sales rose 1.6 percent to 842,000 units (SAAR) in December from a downwardly revised pace of 829,000 units in November and were 15.2 percent higher than one year ago. New home sales are based on the signing of a purchase agreement rather than a closing, as is the case with existing homes. Note that monthly data on new home sales tend to be volatile. For all of 2020, sales reached 811,000 units, 18.7 percent higher than in 2019 and the strongest pace since 2006. (Sources: HUD and Census Bureau)
- **Sales of previously owned (existing) homes rose.** The National Association of Realtors® (NAR) reported that December sales of existing homes (including single-family homes, townhomes, condominiums, and cooperatives) increased 0.7 percent to 6.76 million units (SAAR) from an upwardly revised pace of 6.71 million in November and were 22.2 percent higher than a year earlier. Because existing home sales are based on a closing, December sales reflect contract signings in October and November. Interest rates are low, but lean inventories and house price growth are likely to be restraining sales. For all of 2020, existing home sales climbed to 5.64 million units, 5.6 percent higher than in 2019 and the strongest pace since 2006.
- **New construction rose for single-family homes but fell for multifamily housing.** Single-family housing starts increased 12.0 percent to 1.34 million homes (SAAR) in December from a pace of 1.20 million units the previous month and were up 27.8 percent from one year ago. Multifamily housing (5 or more units in a structure) starts, at 312,000 units (SAAR), declined 15.2 percent from an upwardly revised pace of 368,000 units in November and were down 40.0 percent from a year earlier. Note that month-to-month changes in the construction of multifamily homes are often volatile. Total housing starts increased 5.8 percent to 1.67 million units (SAAR) and were up 5.2 percent year-over-year. Total construction for new homes reached 1.38 million units for all of 2020, 7.0 percent higher than in 2019 and the strongest pace since 2007. (Sources: HUD and Census Bureau)
- **Year-over-year house price increases accelerated, with annual gains ranging from 9 to 11 percent.** The Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA) seasonally adjusted purchase-only house price index for November estimated that home values increased 1.0 percent from the previous month and 11.0 percent from the previous year, up from a 10.3-percent annual gain in October. The FHFA index shows that U.S. home values are 38 percent above their peak, set in April 2007 during the housing bubble, and stand 74 percent above the low point reached in May 2011. Another index tracked in the Monthly Update, the non-seasonally adjusted (NSA) CoreLogic Case-Shiller® 20-City Home Price Index, posted a 1.1 percent increase in home values in November and year-over-year returns of 9.1 percent, up from an annual gain of 8.0 percent for October. The home price data for both indices are based on real estate sales contracts signed in late September and throughout October with subsequent closings during November. COVID-related restrictions and their adverse effects on economic activity had produced moderately decelerating house prices last May and June. (The FHFA and CoreLogic Case-Shiller® price indices are released with a 2-month lag.)
- **The inventory of existing homes for sale reached a new record low.** The listed inventory of new homes for sale, at 302,000 units at the end of December increased 4.1 percent from November but was down 6.2 percent year-over-year. That inventory would support 4.3 months of sales at the current sales pace, up from 4.2 months in November. Available existing homes for sale, at 1.07 million in December—a record low—were down 16.4 percent from the previous month and down 23.0 percent from 1.39 million units a year earlier. That listed inventory represents a 1.9-month supply—a new record low—and was down from 2.3 months in November, the previous record low. A shortage of homes for sale—especially at the lower end of the market—has been a constraint on sales for several years.
- **Forbearance on mortgage loans increased slightly.** The MBA Weekly Forbearance and Call Volume Survey shows the share of mortgage loans in forbearance rose slightly to 5.38 percent the week ending January 17, from 5.37 percent the week ending January 10, but is down from a high of 8.55 percent on June 7, 2020. MBA estimates 2.7 million homeowners are in forbearance plans. The share of these borrowers that were up to date on their mortgage payments in the beginning of January declined to 14.0 percent from 16.8 percent the previous month. Only 0.25 percent of all home loans were in forbearance the week ending March 8, 2020, before COVID-related restrictions took effect.
- **Mortgage rates reach yet another all-time low for the seventeenth time since March.** The 30-year fixed rate mortgage (FRM) reached an average weekly record low in January of 2.65 percent the week ending January 7, down from a record low in December of 2.66 percent the week ending December 24. Prior to March 2020, the record low for the 30-year FRM was 3.31 percent the week ending November 21, 2012, during the recovery from the Great Recession. The 30-year FRM, at 3.64 percent one year ago, has dropped nearly a percentage point in the last 12 months. (Source: Freddie Mac)

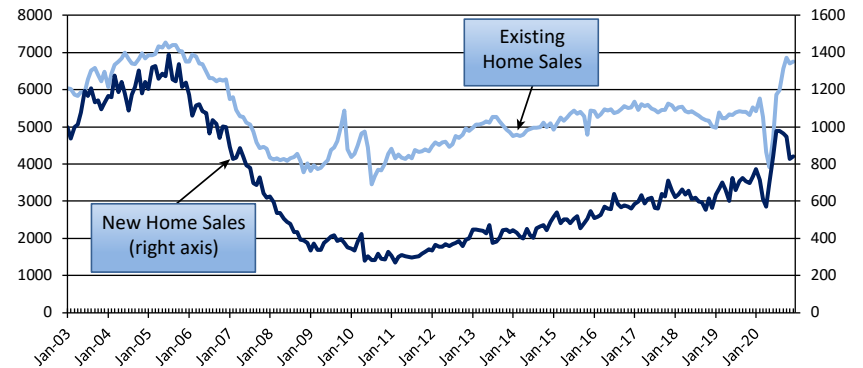
Monthly House Price Trends by Index (\$ Thousands)

Home Sales Rose for New and Existing Homes

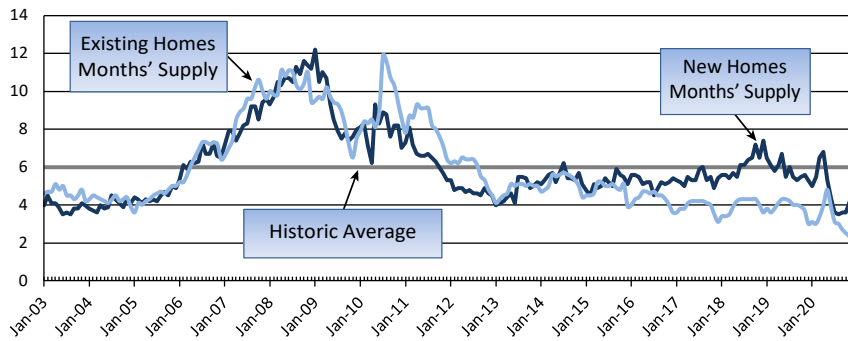
Monthly Sales (Thousands)

The Months' Supply of Homes for Sale Reached a New Record Low for Existing Homes

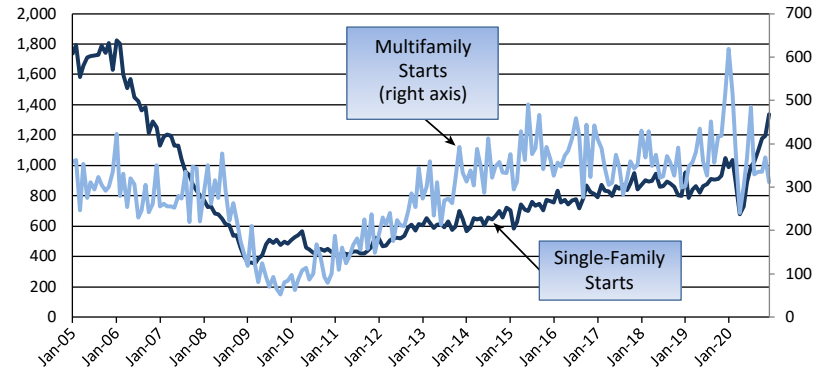
National Months' Supply of New and Existing Homes (Months)

National Housing Starts (Thousands)



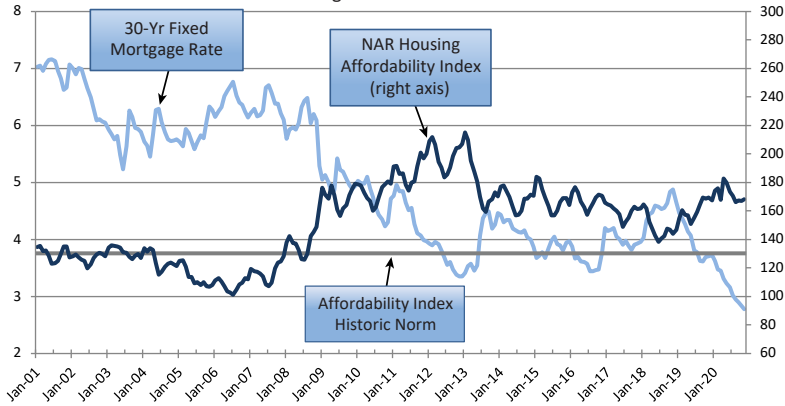

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Homeownership Affordability Remains Above Historic Norm, Mortgage Rates Are at Record Lows

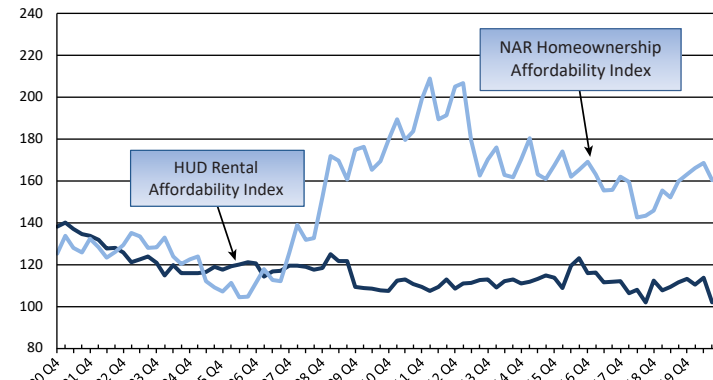
Percentage Rates and Index Values

Rental Affordability Remains a Challenge Due to Rising Rents

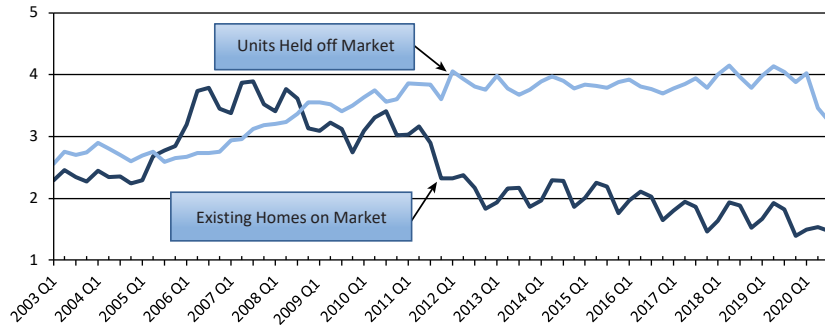
Rental and Homeownership Index Values

Existing Homes Available for Sale (End of Period) and Total Vacant Housing Units (Year Round) off Market (Millions)

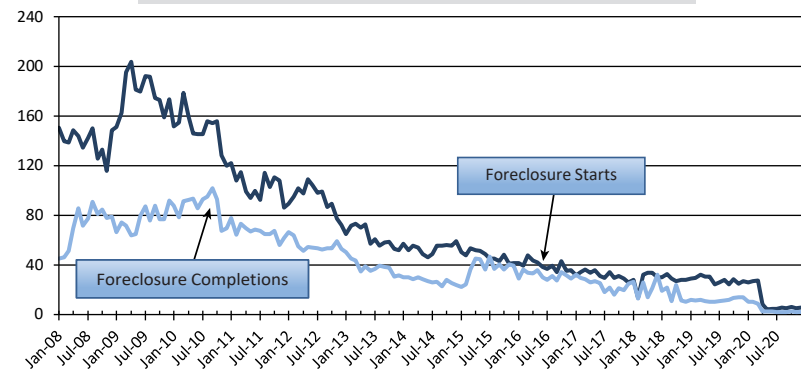

(Includes investor, second home, and jumbo properties)



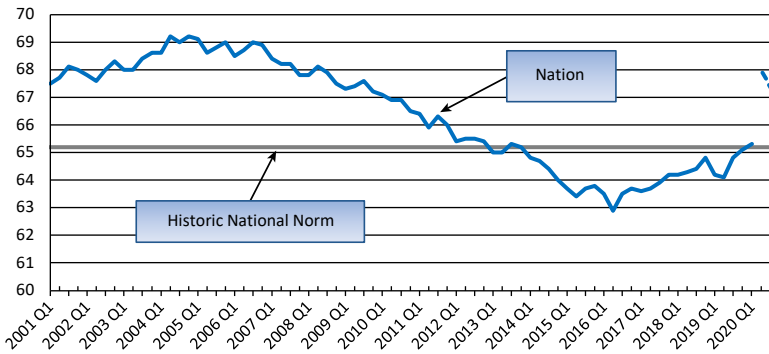

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The National Homeownership Rate Fell in the Third Quarter*

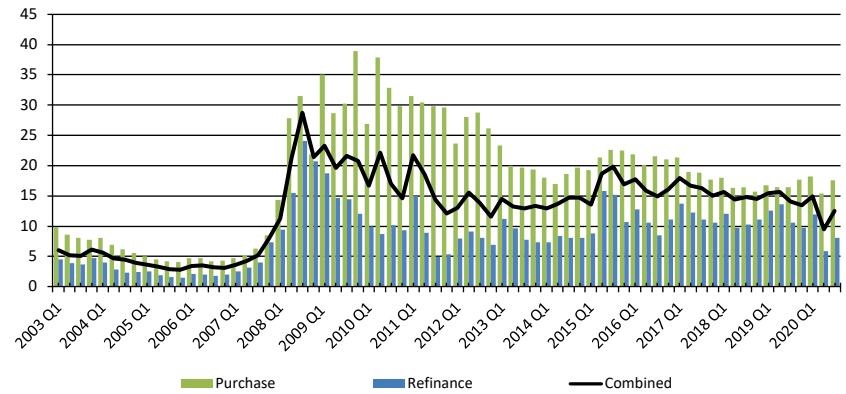
National Homeownership Rate (Percent)

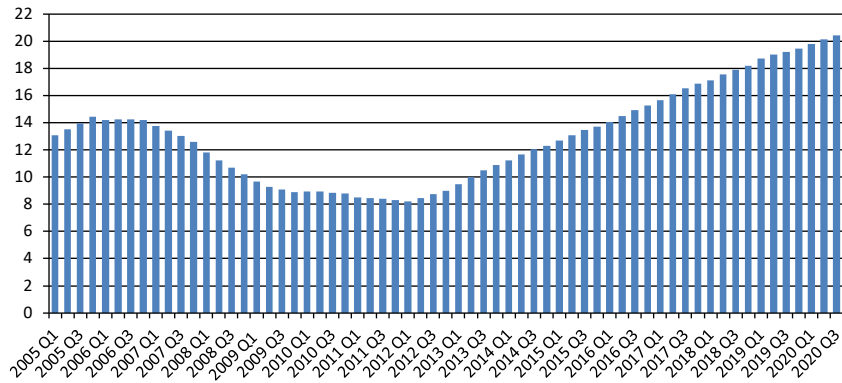
FHA as Share of Quarterly Mortgage Originations by Type (Percent)

A typical renter household is one that earns median income and a typical rental home is a median-priced rental unit. A value of 100 means that a renter household with median income has exactly enough income to qualify for a lease on a median-priced rental home. B. Notes on Charts

1. Monthly house price trends, shown as changes in respective house price indices applied to a common base price set equal to the median price of an existing home sold in January 2003, as reported by the National Association of Realtors®. Indices shown: S&P/CoreLogic Case-Shiller 20-metro composite index (NSA), January 2000 = 100, FHFA monthly (purchase-only) index for U.S. (SA), January 1991 = 100, and CoreLogic-Distressed Sales Excluded (Monthly) for U.S. (NSA), January 2000 = 100. Also see additional note below in Section C on the CoreLogic HPI.
2. Reported seasonally adjusted annual rates for new and existing home sales.
3. A comparison of the affordability of renting a home to purchasing a home, added as of the September 2016 release. HUD's Quarterly Rental Affordability Index is compared to NAR's Composite Quarterly Affordability Index. See note above on Rental Affordability.
4. Filings of a notice of default or scheduled foreclosure auction, depending on which action starts the foreclosure process in a state, are reported for foreclosure starts. Foreclosure completions are properties entering REO. Both as reported by ATTOM Data Solutions (formerly RealtyTrac).
5. FHA market shares are FHA purchase and refinance originations divided by HUD estimates of purchase and refinance mortgage originations, as noted in "Mortgage Originations" above. See additional note below on FHA market share.

C. Additional Notes

Beginning in May 2019, NAR replaced its Composite Housing Affordability Index (HAI), which was based on the 30-year fixed rate mortgage and adjustable rate mortgages (ARM), with a Fixed HAI based only on the 30-year fixed rate mortgage.

Black Knight enhanced their database as of December 2017 data, increasing their database coverage by nearly 1 million additional loans through several new contributors and improved coverage of certain types of data. In addition, HUD added filters to make sure all FHA and VA loans were excluded from the data to ensure reporting of only conventional loans. The November 2017 changes in reported data are mainly due to the additional filters.

FHA Market Share data were updated in the June 2017 report based on the most recent HMDA data and revised house price estimates. FHA market share estimates were based on new methodology beginning with the October 2013 report; estimates were revised back through Q1 2011. The estimate for first-time buyers was 33 percent for 2019, based on the 2019 NAR annual survey of homebuyers released in October 2019. The estimate was the same as their estimate for 2018 with the October 2018 release of the NAR Profile of Home Buyers and Sellers 2018 report. The annual reporting of first-time buyers differs from NAR's monthly Realtors Confidence Index survey because the annual survey, for the most part, represents purchases of homes by owner-occupants and does not include purchases by investors, as in the monthly survey.

CoreLogic's House Price Index (HPI) estimates are based on new methodology beginning with their June 2016 report, which includes data through April 2016. A variety of modeling and other enhancements to their HPI and its forecast, including a 14-percent expansion in the number of transaction pairs, were made.

The BLS Consumer Population Survey/Housing Vacancy Survey (CPS/HVS) collects data on the homeownership rate and is conducted by the Census Bureau. The Bureau views the Q2 and Q3 2020 homeownership rates as a break in series because COVID-19 prevented normal data collection procedures. The data should be viewed with caution. For the Q2 2020 survey, the Census Bureau suspended in-person interviews on March 20, 2020 and conducted the survey for the rest of the first quarter and the entirety of the second solely by telephone interviews. The survey response rate fell to 67 percent in the second quarter from 79 percent in the first quarter and one year ago. For the third quarter, in-person interviews were added back incrementally, with 39 percent added back in July, 50 percent in August, and 100 percent in September.
